For the past year, JCCD has continued to work hard to carry out its mission of "promoting wise land-use decisions, based upon the natural resources of Jackson County, through technical assistance and education."

JCCD Activities Summary (October 1, 2018-September 30, 2019)

- Assistance provided to over 1,550 customers in the office and over the phone
- ♦ 25,775 trees, 610 fruit trees, 1205 berry bushes and asparagus, 271 native plants, and 48 pounds of native grasses sold
 - 51 volunteers contributed 355 total volunteer hours at the tree sale and special events
 - Renewal of MAEAP, CTAI Engineer and Hunter Access Program Grants
 - 2019 Scrap Tire grant received (collected 12,261 scrap tires)
 - Continued work on Invasive Species Grant (MISGP) and applied for 2020 grant through MDNR

HUNTER ACCESS PROGRAM



JCCD has 1 property currently enrolled in the HAP Program for a total of 300 acres. The Mikelonis property is located in northern Jackson County and Southern Ingham County. This property was very well utilized during the 2019 season with several hunters reporting successful hunters.



Because of the current Chronic Wasting Disease issue in Michigan, some of the money from HAP is being diverted to address this problem. However, this HAP property has been renewed for the 2020 hunting season.



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JACKSON COUNTY RECYCLES

- ⇒ Updated the annual recycling guide and informational flyer
- ⇒ Gave a recycling presentation at the Arbor Day Celebration at Potter Park Zoo to 160 students
- ⇒ Had informational booths at the Women's Expo, JAXPO, the Jackson County Fair, and Islands of Wellness
- ⇒ Twelve townships and villages teamed up to hold seven scrap tire collections this year. 12,261 total tires were collected county-wide. JCCD submitted and was approved for the 2020 Scrap Tire grant through DEGLE
- ⇒ The Jackson County Recycles Facebook Page and websites were utilized to increase awareness regarding recycling issues, and to promote recycling events happening in the community
- ⇒ Wrote monthly newsletter articles on topics such as tire recycling, Michigan Green Schools, New Years resolutions to reduce waste, recycling and China, burning household trash, Know it Before You Throw It (EGLE Campaign), and Michigan focusing on improving recycling efforts
- ⇒ The 2019 Earth Day Celebration in the Park had schools participate in a recycling poster contest. Three classrooms participated from three different schools, with a total of 90 posters to choose from. The top 3 posters were put on display at the Earth Day Celebration and are on display in the JCCD office
- ⇒ Planned a November forum for the Jackson community at the Carnegie Branch of the District Library entitled "The Future of Recycling"



HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION

On September 21st, a Household Hazardous Waste Collection event was held at the Jackson County Fairgrounds, (Keeley Park). The following items were collected from a record number of 600+ customers:







- ⇒ 56,797 pounds of hazardous waste (31,130 lbs. collected in 2018)
- \Rightarrow 42,386 pounds of latex paint (18,700 lbs. collected in 2018)
- ⇒ 25,317 pounds of electronic waste (14,000 lbs. collected in 2018)







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ADOPT-A-STREAM PROGRAM

- ⇒ Collection events were held in May and September with Bug ID nights being held for the spring and fall collections.
- ⇒ There were nine collection sites within the Grand River Watershed. These sites produced a variety of insects including stoneflies, dragonflies, mayflies and much more.
- ⇒ 8 volunteers were new to the program this year. Volunteers contributed over 100 hours searching for and identifying the macroinvertebrates.
- ⇒ We continue to educate people at outreach events about water quality and the Adopt-A-Stream program.

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CONSERVATION TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INITIATIVE (CTAI)

The Conservation Technical Assistance Initiative (CTAI) program is a partnership between the Jackson County Conservation District (JCCD), the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD), and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) that aims to promote good stewardship of our land and waters by providing technical assistance to local landowners that want to address natural resource concerns on their property.

During fiscal year 2019, I made over 50 site visits and provided technical assistance for almost 80 conservation practices on 25+ farms across Jackson and 10 other counties in Southeast Michigan. In Jackson County, we completed and certified one contract for \$2,752.71, and added four new contracts which will bring an estimated \$52,571 in federal funding to local farmers. These practices address resource concerns related to soil erosion and compaction, soil and water contamination, animal waste storage, water supply and storage for livestock, fuel and agrichemical storage, and wetland restoration. Over this last year, I gained significant experience in stockwater systems and was able to provide guidance and informal training to other staff in the region. I also attended several training and outreach events including the annual NRCS Engineer & Technician's Workshop in Okemos and the Future City Competition in Novi.

In addition to planning, designing, and inspecting the practices listed above, I support and participate in JCCD events such as the annual tree sale, the household hazardous waste and tire collections, Adopt-A-Stream, the Earth Day Festival, and more.

Management Area - 2019 Fiscal Year Summary

The JLW CISMA has completed 1.5+ years of invasive species education, outreach, survey and management activities in the tri-county region! Funding from the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program allowed us to provide funding for residents and partners to manage invasive species, offer free equipment rentals, perform free site visits to help identify invasive species and guide management strategies. We have 24 local partners who have been instrumental in our successes. They attended our bimonthly partner meetings, organized events, and attended training seminars organized by the ILW CISMA. A summary of our work and milestones achieved this year are listed below!

Education & Outreach

- 48 outreach opportunities
- 1380 people directly engaged
- Booths at Arbor Day, native plant sales, Earth Day, AIS blitz's, boat washes etc...
- Presented at association meetings

Survey & Treatment

- 83.6 acres surveyed and 8.8 acres treated by JLW CISMA
- 347 acres surveyed and 312.5 acres treated by Partners
- Implemented a free injector and sprayer rental program for Japanese knotweed and species requiring foliar spraying

- Oak wilt, Japanese knotweed, Honeysuckle, Barberry, Buckthorn and Phragmites were treated


